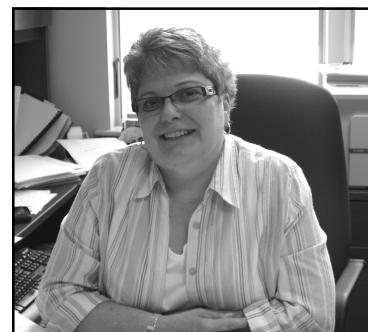

Census 2010

Census takers will continue visiting households though July that did not return a questionnaire by mail. We encourage residents who have not yet completed a questionnaire to fill out the form yourselves or cooperate with census takers who will be contacting you for the information. Your response is confidential and by law, cannot be shared with anyone, including other federal, state and local agencies and law enforcement entities.

Your response is important as half the formula used to calculate the Liquid Fuels Funds distribution is based on population. Census data helps determine the distribution of federal funding, guides community planning, identifies the need for block grants and other grant programs, and finally determines the number of seats Pennsylvania will keep in the U.S. House of Representatives.

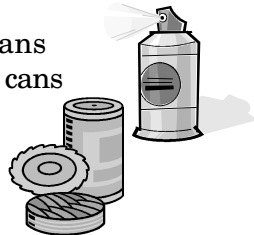

Recycling Matters

Most people know that recycling plays an important role in managing the garbage generated in homes and businesses, and that it reduces the need for landfills and incinerators. But recycling is far more than a local waste management strategy, it is also an important strategy for reducing the environmental impacts of industrial production. Supplying industry with recycled materials, rather than virgin resources extracted from forests and mines, is environmentally preferable because it saves energy, reduces emissions of greenhouse gases and other dangerous air and water pollutants, and because it conserves scarce natural resources.

HERE ARE SOME FACTS AND FIGURES about recycling from the National Recycling Coalition that should serve as food for thought.

Large 32 gallon recycling containers are available at the Township office.

Aluminum Cans

- Every 3 months, Americans landfill enough aluminum to rebuild our entire commercial air fleet.
- The average person has the opportunity to recycle more than 25,000 cans in a lifetime.
- Recycling a single aluminum can saves enough energy to power a television for three hours.

Paper

- Americans throw away enough office paper each year to build a 12-foot-high wall of paper from New York City to Seattle.
- Making paper from recycled materials reduces contributions to air pollution by 95 percent.
- Recycling a stack of newspapers just 3 feet high saves one tree.

Glass

- Glass can be recycled an indefinite number of times and never wears out.
- Making glass from recycling materials cuts related water pollution by 50 percent.
- Recycling one glass jar saves enough electricity to light a conventional 60-watt bulb for 4 hours or an 11-watt compact fluorescent bulb for 20 hours.

Plastic

- Americans use 205 million plastic bottles every hour, most of which are thrown in the trash.
- Recycling plastic uses half as much energy as burning it in an incinerator.
- Five PET bottles, such as plastic soda bottles, yield enough fiber for one extra large T-shirt, one square foot of carpet, or the stuffing for one ski jacket.

County and Township Per Capita and Real Estate taxes are mailed in February. Northern York County School District Per Capita and Real Estate taxes are mailed in July. If you do not received your tax notices, please call me. Payments made after December 15 must be in cash, cashier check, or money order. Unpaid tax notices will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector or County at the end of the year, incurring added cost.

You may also check to see if your tax payment from your escrow company was received at my office. Send a self-addressed, stamped envelope and a copy of your bill and I will receipt it and send it back to you.

I would like to be available when you have questions so leave a message and a toll free number and I will return your call. Also there is a mail slot in the tax office door for your convenience. You may use it anytime.

Road Work

Several road work projects are scheduled for 2010. Warrington Road and Stoney Run Road wearing course is to be placed from Old York Road to a point on Stoney Run Road. Shoulder work will be done on Stoney Run Road (from Route 74 to the Township line) and Ore Bank Road (from Mumper Lane to Northern Dancer Drive) which includes base repair and shoulder reconstruction. Wearing course placement will also occur on this portion of Ore Bank Road. Lynes Road will be sealed by tar and chipping. The road crew also will be cleaning and repairing drainage facilities throughout the Township, mowing along roads and replacing storm culverts at various locations.



Just a reminder.....

- Please do not blow grass clippings out on the roads. These clipping eventually end up in the storm gutters and drains causing clogs.
- Property owners along Township roads are asked to please keep shrubs and trees trimmed back off the road right-of-way.
- Please slow down and keep alert on roadways when work of any kind is being performed. This is for your safety as well as the workers.
- Permanent basketball hoops are not permitted within the Township road right-of-way.

Property Tax Relief

Application for Property Tax Relief Homestead & Farmstead Exclusions are available at the York County Assessment Office 717-771-9232, the Northern York County School District 717-432-8691, x 1109 or on line at www.york-county.org (select Department-Assessment Office). To receive school property tax relief for tax years beginning July 1 or January 1, this form must be filed by the preceding March 1. Your school district is required to notify you by December 31 of each year if your property is not approved for the homestead or farmstead exclusion or if your approval is due to expire.

An Update On The DILLSBURG EARTHQUAKE SWARM

Here we are, entering the 19th month of the earthquake swarm. The first quarter of 2010 has been fairly quiet, at least as far as reports were concerned. A small cluster of tremors were reported on May 22nd and 23rd in the Stoney Run Road area, but other than that the tremor count rose very slowly. Presently a total of 950 tremors have been reported to me since the start in October, 2008. As local activity seemed to be calming, Dr. Charles Scharnberger of Millersville University and I continue to read both older and new articles written on East Coast earthquake swarms. Thus far, we are placing Dillsburg as the top of the list for its duration (19 months) of activity.

We were also saying that the Dillsburg swarm may have produced a large number of tremors in a short time. Although 950 tremors have been reported by residents, we figure that 2,000 – 3,000 tremors have actually occurred. Recently an article was published concerning an earthquake swarm in Alabama where 2,000 tremors were produced in 2 months – wow.

So what is new with the research on the Dillsburg swarm? We have partnered with the United States Geological Survey (U.S.G.S.) in placing several ground water monitoring gauges on an inactive well in the area. The one instrument is recording the height of the water table every 15 minutes and this information will be downloaded onto a computer for study. We will see if the groundwater is playing a role in the earthquakes after its 6-month monitoring period. The second instrument is a old-style paper drum recorder and is set up to place a vertical mark on the paper if the groundwater would swish around during a larger earthquake.

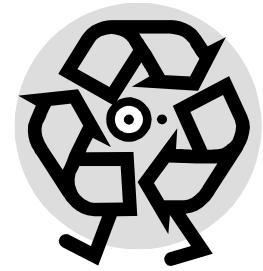
The paper drum was tested on June 3rd when a larger tremor shook the region. Guess what, the tremor left its mark on the graph paper as a short vertical line as the water swished back and forth. More importantly, the tremor and its intensity was a surprise. There were no warning signs that a larger tremor was upcoming. At 8:25 am, the tremor was felt as far away as Hummelstown, Wellsville and Dover and all points in between. First listed as a 3.1 event on the Richter scale, the seismologists at Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory down graded the event down to a 2.9. Based on the region the tremor was felt and reactions by residents, we feel that the 3.1 is a better assignment for the quake.

With no temporary seismographs in the area at this point, we had to establish the epicenter by relying on resident interviews and emails. The epicenter for this tremor, generally speaking, has been established west of Mount Pleasant, south of Siddonsburg Road West, east of Filey's Road and north of Rock Spring Camp. Although no damage was reported, broken glass housewares, pictures off of walls and dislodged wall-hanging electronics were reported.

In early April, Jeri Jones conducted a Dillsburg Earthquake Swarm presentation to the 6th graders at Northern Middle School. After the presentation, very good questions were asked by the students ranging from the possibility of a major earthquake to how long will this swarm last. A display containing the important information about the Dillsburg Earthquake Swarm has been presented to Carroll Township. This exhibit will be on display at the Carroll Township building for anyone to view.

Finally, thank you to all of the local government officials, police and fire personnel and the many residents who have assisted in gathering information and providing research equipment.

Electronic Recycling



The York County Solid Waste Authority, 2700 Blackbridge Road, York, PA, phone 717-845-1066, has an ongoing recycling program for electronics. The Authority work with ECO International to collect and manage the electronics generated in York County.

The Authority will have acceptance hours every 3rd Saturday at the Yard Waste Transfer Site off of Flour Mill Road in Manchester Township, across from the Resource Recovery Center, 2651 Blackbridge Road, York, PA. The hours will be 9:00am to 1:00pm. The YCSWA web site www.ycswa.org has been updated with program specifics including the Saturday acceptance dates. Click on Recycling and Electronics.

Residents and businesses may bring up to three of each type of electronic equipment accepted (e.g. three computers, and three printers, and three TVs, etc.). There is no fee to participate in this program. Participants are responsible for removal of any personal data contained on electronic devices and computer hard drives.

Items accepted include answering machines, compact disc players, electric typewriters, fax machines, hard drives, laptops, mobile phones, modems, microwave ovens, pagers, personal computers (CPU, monitors, keyboards, mouse, and peripherals), printers, printed circuit boards, radios, remote controls, stereos, tape players, telephones/telephone equipment, televisions, and VCR's.

Do Not Bring:

Electric equipment (such as toasters, hair dryers, wall clocks, or electric razors) OR construction demolition, furniture, appliances, white goods, or household hazardous waste.

Why is Electronic Waste a Potential Problem?

Electronic equipment contains lead, mercury, cadmium and chromium which have environmental consequences when disposed of improperly. One computer can contain up to as much as eight pounds of lead.

What Happens to the Electronics I Bring to the Event?

The Authority hires an outside vendor specializing in electronics recycling to manage the materials collected during this event. The vendor will harvest useable parts (circuit boards, power supplies, wood, plastic, and CRT glass); valuable metals (gold, copper, steel, aluminum); and potentially harmful components (lead, mercury and cadmium) and recycle them. Virtually all but one percent of the materials are recycled into new products.

Carroll Township Police News



D.A.R.E.

Carroll Township Police have entered a partnership with the Northern York County School District to continue with the D.A.R.E. program since funding was cut by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Carroll Township Police and the Northern York County School District are committed to educating students of the dangers of substance abuse

D.A.R.E. is taught at the sixth grade level at the Northern Middle School by Sgt John Schreiner, Officer Ronald Stiles and Officer Ben Martin.

South Central Terrorism Task Force

Carroll Township Police have four officers assigned to the South Central Counter Terrorism Task Force. The task force is made up of eight counties from central Pennsylvania, which is comprised of law enforcement officers, emergency medical services, fire fighters, animal control personnel, area hospitals and specialized teams from HAZ-MAT and SWAT. The mission for SCTF is to address planning, prevention, response and recovery for events in South Central PA that exceed local capabilities.

York County Institutes New Communications Systems

York County Office of Emergency Services has implemented a new radio system to all emergency services in the county.

The new radio system enhances communication between a multitude of different agencies. In the post 9/11 era, inter agency communication is a must. Now a police officer can communicate with fire personnel and emergency medical services with just a turn of a knob.

Police vehicles in Carroll Township are equipped with a Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system. The CAD system aids the officer by dispatching calls over the computer using an e-mail like system, thus providing a greater detailed synopsis of the call that may be crucial as to how the officer responds.

The new CAD computer also allows the officer to obtain drivers and vehicle information within seconds. The officer can also check a person for nationwide, state and local warrants. The computer is equipped with many different programs so the officer can do reports in the vehicle. This allows the officer to spend more time on the street combating crime.

Tips for Residents of Carroll Township

More burglaries are occurring during daylight hours than during the night-time hours. Carroll Township Police remind all residents to make sure all garage doors are closed. Police also urge vehicle owners to secure vehicle doors and to remove all valuables from inside of them. Most recent thefts from vehicles are from unlocked doors.

With the weather getting warmer and more people going outdoors, police would like to remind drivers that Pennsylvania laws require that vehicles must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians that are in the crosswalks.

The mission of the Carroll Township Emergency Management Agency is the planning, assignment, and coordination of all available resources in an integrated program of prevention, preparedness, response, and recovery for emergencies by either man-made or natural disasters that occur in Carroll Township.

Point of Dispensing (POD)

Carroll Township E.M.A. is very active in the community. CEMA members participated along with emergency management agencies from Dillsburg Borough, Franklin Township, Franklintown Borough, Monaghan Township and York County Office of Emergency Management in the Point of Dispensing (POD) drill that occurred in the fall of 2009. The drill simulated the dispensing of medication to the general public in response to simulated medical emergency and was a model for York County in order to develop standards and operating procedures for Pennsylvania and York County.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

CERT training, as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), promotes a partnering effort between emergency services and the people that they serve. The goal is for qualified CERT instructors to train members of neighborhoods, community organizations, or workplaces in basic response skills. CERT members are then integrated into the emergency response capability for their area. In the event of a natural or man-made disaster, these individuals would provide assistance to their community if emergency services were delayed in response



York County currently has more than 40 certified CERT Instructors and over 700 CERT team members. Classes are conducted on the basis of demand. Each member who graduates from the class receives a CERT backpack full of response tools.

Chestnut Park Walking Path

Carroll Township is requesting contractors bid a multi-use paved path located at Chestnut Park. The path will loop the park and will be just over 4,000 feet in length and 8 feet wide. It will also connect the parking lot with a future concession stand, playground and pavilion. Provided contractor bids come in as anticipated, estimated completion date for the path construction will be July 2010.



York County Mosquito Facts - www.westnile.state.pa.us

The York County West Nile Virus Program has documented 31 different species of mosquitoes in York County. Four of these species are not native to York County. Mosquito species found in York County require at least 7 days to complete their life cycle from egg to emerging adult. If a water source dries up within 72 hours it will not breed mosquitoes.

Only adult female mosquitoes bite to acquire a blood meal in order to lay eggs. Both adult male and female mosquitoes feed on pollen and nectar for food.

Mosquitoes have two specific kinds of habitat: (1) Breeding sources which require water at some point for eggs to hatch and (2) Adult resting habitat area which is shaded and provides some kind of moisture.

As winter turns to spring, homeowners should look around their properties and eliminate areas that could lead to standing water where mosquitoes could breed. Dispose of any refuse that can hold water such as cans, containers and used tires. Containers that cannot be emptied should be treated with an insecticide that targets mosquito larvae. Clean clogged roof gutters and check storm drains, leaky faucets and window wells. Empty accumulated water from wheelbarrows, boats, tarps, toys and flower pots. Do not allow water to stagnate in birdbaths, ornamental pools, water gardens and swimming pool covers. Alter the landscape of your property to eliminate standing water.

Keep in mind that during warm weather, mosquitoes can breed in any puddle of water.
