Examples when Permits are needed:

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

METAL

- Aluminum beverage cans
- Steel and bi-metal food & beverage cans
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels.



GLASS

- Clear, blue, brown and green glass food & beverage containers
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels and neck rings.



PLASTICS

- Plastic containers #1, #2 and #5 with a neck smaller than the base
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels and neck rings.



NEWSPAPER

- ✓ Clean and Dry.
- ✓ No food contact.
- ✓ Cover loose paper with heavier items in the container to prevent them from blowing.



CARDBOARD

- All sizes of corrugated cardboard and shipping boxes
- ✓ Dry and flattened.
- ✓ No food contact.
- ✓ Bundle any large or loose pieces of cardboard that will not fit in your recycling bin.



CARTONS

- Shelf-stable and refrigerated food and beverage cartons
- ✓ Remove and dispose of straws and caps in the trash.
- ✓ Rinse cartons.

Spring Cleaning Tips

Warmer weather is right around the corner. During this time, many people like to do some spring cleaning. Below are some resources for you to check out before you place everything in the trash.

Many items can be recycled, reused, or donated. More dangerous items, such as household hazardous waste items, pose a serious safety risk and cannot be placed in your curbside trash and recycling bins.

- Recycle as much as you can using the Recycling Guidelines on Page 2.
- In Pennsylvania, certain electronics are restricted by law from being disposed of in the trash due to the toxic metals they contain. Fairview Township Recycling Center, 55 Fairview Road, New Cumberland is open to all York County residents free of charge. Call 717-901-5200 for details. Some examples of electronic waste are: computers, computer peripherals (keyboards, mouse, printer, etc.), computer monitors, and televisions.
- Empty paint cans should be placed in your bagged trash, If you're not sure how to dispose of your half-empty paint cans, we recommend the following:
 1. Consider donating your paint to a community center or charity. They're often working on projects with a limited budget and could use the extra supplies.
 2. Harden the paint by adding equal parts cat litter to the paint in the can. Stir the cat litter into the paint until it thickens. Allow the mixture to sit for one hour before placing in your bagged trash. ***Please remember there is a 50 lb. weight limit on your trash container.
- Clothing should never be placed in your curbside recycling bin. The materials get wrapped around the processing equipment at the recycling facility, causing it to jam up and break. Many non-profits such as Salvation Army, Goodwill, and consignment shops accept used clothing for donation. As a last resort, clothing can be placed in your curbside trash container.
- For something else that does not fit into the above categories, check www.ycswa.com for additional resources.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection “At Your Door Special Collection ”



York County residents can take advantage of a service for proper management of their household hazardous waste that's as easy as stepping out the front door. The service, called "At Your Door Special Collection", enables residents to call a toll-free number to schedule a home pick-up of household hazardous waste.

Residents may schedule two pick-ups per home, per calendar year and can request up to two "kit bags" per pick-up to fill with accepted household hazardous products. Bags measure 30" wide x 40" high. The "At Your Door Special Collection" pick-up service requires a \$15 co-pay for each service call. Residents who wish to participate in "At Your Door Special Collection" pick-ups, may call 800-449-7587 Monday-Friday from 8am to 8pm to schedule a pick-up.

Plastic kit bags, an instruction sheet, cable ties, a survey card, labels for unlabeled containers and a payment envelope (payment may be made by check or money order) will be sent via the U.S. Postal Service prior to the scheduled pick-up date. Household hazardous waste includes any products from the home that are corrosive (drain cleaners or bleach), flammable (gasoline), reactive (chemistry kits) or toxic (pesticides).

Leaf Waste Drop-off Facility

The Carroll Township Leaf Waste Drop-off Facility is open year around for disposal of leaf waste. It is located on Sunny Lane behind the Township Maintenance Shed. You must apply for a Key Card to access the facility. Key cards are available for residential, non-residential and landscape/lawn service businesses which reside in the Township. Applications are available at the Township office and our website www.carrolltownship.com. The applications are processed at the Township office. Cards are free to residents, \$300 to non-residential and \$500 to landscape/lawn service businesses. Lost or damaged cards can be replaced for a \$20 fee.

Materials accepted are leaves, twigs, branches, tree trimmings (8' or shorter and 14" or less in diameter), garden residue, and small shrubs. NO grass clippings. All items must be removed from bags. Do not leave bags in the facility. These materials are transported to a PA DEP permitted composting site.

Do not drop-off root balls, skids, treated lumber, telephone poles, railroad ties, bricks, stones, metal, steel, aluminum, furniture, garbage of any type, tires, batteries, construction materials or any other item that is not considered Leaf Waste. These items can damage the equipment during processing. This facility is monitored by security cameras and anyone who does not abide by the rules could be denied access for a minimum of the remainder of the calendar year.



Penn Waste offers an additional option for the recycling of leaf waste. This is a curbside pick up May through November, the first Saturday of the month. Materials such as tree trimmings, shrubbery and other organic landscape vegetation will be collected. Leaf waste needs to be in biodegradable brown paper bags or bundle it with biodegradable twine in easy-to-handle bundles. Bundles may be no longer than 5 feet, weigh no more than 30 pounds and not exceed 6 inches in diameter. Leaf waste must be placed at the curb before 6:30am on the scheduled day. An unlimited number of bags or bundles will be taken. Grass Clippings, fruit and vegetables, tree stumps and dirt/stones will not be collected. Leaf waste in plastic bags will not be collected.

Home composting is an acceptable form of recycling leaf waste.



Recycling Grant Award

On November 21, 2020, the Department of Environmental Protection awarded Carroll Township a recycling programs grant under Section 902 of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act in the amount of \$101,030. Grant funds are used to develop and implement recycling programs. Projects eligible for grant funding are those that divert the following recyclable materials from municipal solid waste: source separated recyclable materials (clear and colored glass, aluminum, steel and bimetallic cans, high-grade office paper, newsprint, corrugated cardboard, plastics), source separated food scrapes and leaf waste. Municipalities and counties are eligible for up to 90% funding of approved recycling program costs. Funds awarded to Carroll Township through this grant will be used for recycling education in the form of newsletters, commercial recycling flyers and recycling handouts. The cost of recycling containers for residents are an approved expense. Included in the grant is a Ford F550 dump truck to tow the leaf vacuum and haul tree trimmings and chips back to our facility. We will also purchase two leaf collection boxes to use during our seasonal leaf waste collection. These grant funds are instrumental in offsetting the cost of our curbside recycling, leaf waste collection and recycling education program.

Bulk Items

One bulk item per week that can be lifted by two men will be picked up on your regular trash day. Appliances containing Freon must be pre-scheduled by calling Penn Waste at 717-767-4456. For safety purposes, doors to appliances must be removed. Pay Per Bag customers must attach a Penn Waste trash bag to the bulk item.

Acceptable Bulk Items:

Furniture, washer/dryer, hot water tank, dish washers, mattresses, carpet (4' length rolled/tied), kerosene heaters, lawn mowers, and similar (must have a dry fuel tank and lids removed), automobile tire off the rim (1 per week).

Unacceptable Bulk Items:

Household hazardous waste, chemicals, propane tanks, yard waste, construction waste and loose piles.



Please do not place plastic bags in your curbside recycling bins!

Plastic bags get wrapped around the recycling equipment and jam up the machinery. Workers must climb into the machinery to manually remove the plastic bags that get wrapped around the equipment.

Safe Medication Collection Box

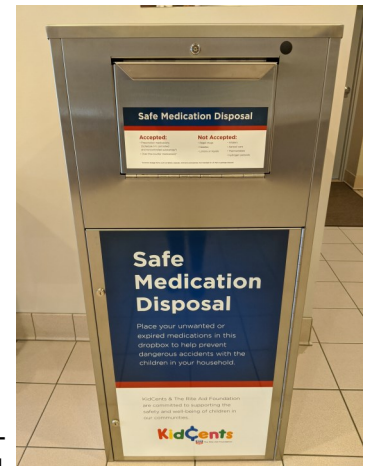
Carroll Township has a Safe Medication Disposal box in the lobby.

Accepted items include: prescriptions, prescription solid or liquid medications, prescription patches & ointments, inhalers, over-the-counter medication, vitamins, and medications for pets.

Not Accepted items include: thermometers, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, personal care products in the form of non-prescription ointments, liquids or lotions, medications from businesses or clinics, needles (sharps), bloody or infectious waste and hazardous waste.

Medications collected in the take-back box program are delivered by law enforcement to the York County Solid Waste Authority's waste-to-energy facility for safe and complete destruction. Law enforcement also maintains the box and secures medications that are received until they can be destroyed.

Eighteen York County police departments currently partner with the York County Solid Waste Authority (YCSWA) to host Secure Medication Disposal boxes in their police department lobbies. In 2020, the program safely collected and disposed of a total of 3.62 tons of unused and expired residential medications. This program helps to eliminate drug abuse by providing a safe means of disposing of drugs and presents an opportunity to educate the public about the potential for abuse of medications.



Retired Flag Disposal Box



Do you have a worn flag to dispose of? Carroll Township has a retired flag drop-off box located just inside the main doors. Collected flags will be given to the American Legion for proper disposal. Flags may be dropped off during normal office hours.

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4) Reporting Illicit Discharges for Carroll Township

Carroll Township is one of many municipalities included on the list of small MS4 programs across Pennsylvania that are subject to Pennsylvania DEP and Federal EPA regulations governing stormwater quality. Municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4) are systems that collect and convey stormwater from developed areas of the Township to nearby streams. These systems are designed for stormwater only, and are separated from wastewater systems. To comply with MS4 regulations, municipalities such as Carroll Township are required to develop stormwater management programs that are responsible for meeting certain requirements to improve and maintain water quality.

Requirements include informing the public of the program and its requirements and inviting them to participate in the program. Residents are encouraged to participate in public meetings to discuss stormwater management, volunteer to educate the rest of the public, and conduct community clean-ups that can help prevent pollution from reaching storm sewers. There are many associations within our area that provide programs to improve our water. Yellow Breeches Watershed Association and Watershed Alliance of York are two groups that provide opportunities for watershed stewardship.

Carroll Township is also responsible for proper maintenance and controlling the quality of the stormwater that is released into our local streams. Part of pollution prevention includes detecting and eliminating illicit discharges, which are pollutants that enter stormwater-only sewer systems, often as a result from human actions. Common illicit discharges include sanitary wastewater, chemical spills, oils and fluids from vehicles, vehicle washwater, pet wastes, and nutrients from lawn care. These discharges are not treated before being released into streams, so pollutants are not removed. These pollutants reduce water quality and negatively impact aquatic life in our streams and rivers.



The following practices can help Carroll Township comply with MS4 regulations:

- Reduce fertilizer use or use more natural or organic fertilizers.
- Dispose of pet waste properly and do not deposit into storm sewer drains.
- Collect oil and other vehicle fluids with drip pan, and recycle or dispose of properly.
- Store hazardous substances like solvents and cleaners properly to avoid leaks and spills.
- Wash your vehicle on a grass surface and reduce the amount of soap used.
- Plant trees, shrubs and rain gardens, and keep grass taller to control stormwater runoff.
- Report soil and other pollutants leaving poorly managed construction sites.

Suspected illicit discharges of any sort, should be reported to Carroll Township at (717) 432-4951 and/or submit an Illicit Discharge Report Form. Why Maintain Your Septic System

Saves you money

Regular maintenance fees of \$250 to \$500 every three to five years is a bargain compared to the cost of repairing or replacing a malfunctioning system, which can cost between \$3,000 and \$7,000 for a conventional system. Alternative systems can cost even more.

Protects your property value

An unusable septic system or one in disrepair will lower your property value, and potentially can pose a costly legal liability.

Keeps you and your neighbors healthy

Household wastewater contains disease causing bacteria and viruses and high levels of nitrogen and phosphorus. If a septic system is well-maintained and working properly, it will remove most of these pollutants.

Protects the environment

More than four billion gallons of wastewater are dispersed below the ground's surface every day. Ground water contaminated by poorly or untreated household wastewater poses dangers to drinking water and to the environment. Malfunctioning septic systems can release bacteria, viruses, and chemicals toxic to local waterways.

Inspect and Pump Frequently

The average household septic system should be pumped and inspected at least every three years by a septic service professional.

Use Water Efficiently

The average indoor water use in a typical single-family home is nearly 70 gallons per individual, per day. Just a single leaky or running toilet can waste as much as 200 gallons of water per day.

The more water a household conserves, the less water enters the septic system. Efficient water use improves the operation of a septic system and reduces the risk of failure.

Properly Dispose of Waste

Your septic system is not a trash can. An easy rule of thumb: Do not flush anything besides human waste and toilet paper. Never flush:

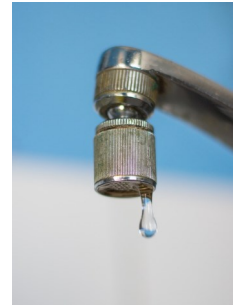
- Cooking grease or oil
- Non-flushable wipes, such as baby wipes or other wet wipes
- Dental floss, Diapers, Cat Litter, Paper Towels, Feminine hygiene products
- Cigarette butts, Coffee Grounds, Pharmaceuticals
- Household chemicals like gasoline, oil, pesticides, antifreeze, and paint or paint thinners

Maintain Your Drainfield

Your drainfield—a component of your septic system that removes contaminants from the liquid that emerges from your septic tank—is an important part of your septic system. Here are a few things you should do to maintain it:

- Never park or drive on your drainfield.
- Plant trees the appropriate distance from your drainfield to keep roots from growing into your septic system. A septic service professional can advise you of the proper distance.
- Keep roof drains, sump pumps, and other rainwater drainage systems away from your drainfield area. Excess water slows down or stops the wastewater treatment process.

Register your Rental Properties

The Code of Carroll Township Chapter 299 requires landlords to report the name and address of all tenants who occupy a dwelling unit within 30 days after said occupancy or 15 days after a dwelling unit has been vacated. It is the responsibility of the landlord to obtain and submit the forms to Christina Heisey, Carroll Township Tax Collector. Forms are available on www.carrolltownship.com.

Dog Licenses are Required

State law requires all dogs over 3 months of age to be licensed. Owners of unlicensed dogs are subject to fines not less than \$50.00 and not to exceed \$300.00. Annual Licenses can be applied for in three different way; in person, by mail or by applying online. Annual dog license applications can also be downloaded from the website <http://yorkcountypa.gov>. (click on Department, Treasurer and Dog License) and mailed with check or money order to "York County Treasurer".

Dogs three months of age or older may be licensed permanently through the County Treasurer's Office. A tattoo is placed on the inside of the right-hind leg of the dog or a micro-chip is placed under the skin. A lifetime permanent license tag is also issued. This eliminates the need to purchase annual dog licenses. Questions regarding this procedure should be directed to the Treasurer's Office at 717-771-9603 or e-mailed to: Treasurer@yorkcountypa.gov for more information.



Other services the Treasure's Office can help you with are transferring a dog license between counties to a new dog owner and replacement tags for annual or lifetime tags that were damaged or misplaced.

Highway Department Comments

Carroll Township makes every effort to keep its roads in good condition and safe for travel. Constant work and maintenance goes into keeping our roads hazard free. The Township’s proposed road projects for 2021 will consist of the following:

- **Fishers Run Development** – Base repair and resurfacing of all roads. (Wooded Run Dr., Brookside Cir., Creek Bottom Cir., and Stillwater Cir.)
- **Hillcrest Drive** – Base repair and resurfacing
- **Maple Street** - Resurfacing.

Dates of the proposed work will be posted on the Township website and on site prior to work beginning. Expect road closures or lane restrictions for this work.

The Township Road Crew will also be cleaning and repairing drainage facilities, mowing along roads and routine maintenance of infrastructure throughout the Township. As always, please slow down and keep alert on roadways when work of any kind is being performed. This is for your safety as well as the workers.
