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When are permits required?

A **building permit** is needed for new construction over 200 square feet, and any additions, alterations, renovations or repairs. Finished basements, electric upgrades, solar panels, pre-built sheds, in ground and above ground swimming pools-inflatable pools included, decks, gazebos, spas and hot tubs, generator installs, retaining walls over 4 foot high and demolition of existing structures are examples of when a building permit is required. Most building permits fall under the PA Uniform Construction Code which require review of the application and inspections of the construction. In order to make it easier for our residents, we handle the applications in house and use ARRO or Approved Code Services as our Municipal Code Officials.

A **zoning permit** is required when erecting or adding to any structure. Most of the above building permit examples will also need a zoning permit to confirm appropriate setbacks for your project. A zoning permit is also needed for a fence, any in home business, any change of use, and to erect a sign.

A **driveway permit** is needed if constructing a new driveway, or when adding to the width of the driveway at the roadway.

A **stormwater permit** is required with new construction that involves over 200 square feet of impervious area. New homes and additions, accessory buildings, and changes to driveways or landscape that create a possible runoff problem for their neighbor will require a stormwater permit.

An **encroachment permit** is needed for an open cut or boring of a Township road or right-of-way.

Be aware that construction started without permits can result in double permit fees as well as removal of illegally constructed structures.

Most building projects will require both a building and zoning permit.

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

METAL

- Aluminum beverage cans
- Steel and bi-metal food & beverage cans
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels.



GLASS

- Clear, blue, brown and green glass food & beverage containers
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels and neck rings.



PLASTICS

- Plastic containers #1, #2 and #5 with a neck smaller than the base
- ✓ Rinse thoroughly to ensure they are free of contaminants and residue.
- ✓ Remove caps or lids and dispose of them in the trash.
- ✓ It is not necessary to remove labels and neck rings.



NEWSPAPER

- ✓ Clean and Dry.
- ✓ No food contact.
- ✓ Cover loose paper with heavier items in the container to prevent them from blowing.



CARDBOARD

- All sizes of corrugated cardboard and shipping boxes
- ✓ Dry and flattened.
- ✓ No food contact.
- ✓ Bundle any large or loose pieces of cardboard that will not fit in your recycling bin.



CARTONS

- Shelf-stable and refrigerated food and beverage cartons
- ✓ Remove and dispose of straws and caps in the trash.
- ✓ Rinse cartons.

Electronic Recycling Location Change

Under PA Act 108 (the state's Covered Device Recycling Act), it is unlawful for Pennsylvania landfills and resource recovery facilities to accept specific electronic devices (computers, computer peripherals and televisions) for disposal. PA waste haulers are also prohibited from collecting these electronics for disposal. Fairview Township's Electronic Recycling Center is open to all York County residents free of charge. Spring/Summer (April-Oct) hours are Monday—Saturday, 8:00am to 4:30pm except holidays. Fall/Winter (Nov-March) hours are Monday—Friday, 9:00am to Noon and the 1st and 3rd Saturday of every month, from 9:00am to Noon except holidays.

Fairview Township's Electronics Recycling Drop-Off Center has moved and is now located at 285 Spanglers Mill Road, New Cumberland.

Other electronic devices that are accepted at the drop-off include answering machines, CD players, fax machines, computer hard drives, mobile phones, modems, microwave ovens, pagers, small home office copiers, printers, circuit boards, clocks, radios, remote controls, stereos, tape players, MP3 players, electronic toys and games, photo and video cameras, telephones and telephone equipment, VCRs, humidifiers, (no dehumidifiers!), toaster ovens, hair dryers, electric razors, and many other mixed household electronics.



York County businesses, schools and organizations are not eligible to participate in this residential electronics recycling program. Additional information can be found at www.twp.fairview.pa.us.

First Energy Frequently Used On-line Tools

Easy, time-saving, and accessible tools are important. FirstEnergy offers the following frequently used tools on their website. The website may be a good option to submit a request without having to wait on the phone for a Customer Service Representative.

The following tools are available:

- Start, stop, or transfer service
- Report a tree problem
- Report a lighting problem
- Request electrical work (new construction, upgrade service, or access to the customer guide to electric service)



As a reminder it is always beneficial to have a specific reference point (pole #, address, street intersection, etc.) before reporting an issue or an account number for requests involving existing services. This may be required to complete the submission and helps the responding Met-Ed crews navigate to the site more efficiently.

Leaf Waste Drop-off Facility

The Carroll Township Leaf Waste Drop-off Facility is open year around for disposal of leaf waste. It is located on Sunny Lane behind the Township Maintenance Shed. You must apply for a Key Card to access the facility. Key cards are available for residential, non-residential and landscape/lawn service businesses which reside in the Township. Application forms are available at the Township office and our website www.carrolltownship.com. The applications are processed at the Township office and require a minimum of one day to enter information into the key card system. Cards are free to residents, \$300 to non-residential and \$500 to landscape/lawn service businesses (All accepted materials must originate from Carroll Township). Lost or damaged cards can be replaced for a \$20 fee.

Materials accepted are leaves, twigs, branches, tree trimmings (8' or shorter and 14" or less in diameter), garden residue, and small shrubs. NO grass clippings. All items must be removed from bags. Do not leave bags in the facility. These materials are transported to a PA DEP permitted composting site.

Do not drop-off root balls, skids, treated lumber, telephone poles, railroad ties, bricks, stones, metal, steel, aluminum, furniture, garbage of any type, tires, batteries, construction materials or any other item that is not considered leaf waste. These items can damage the equipment during processing. This facility is monitored by security cameras and anyone who does not abide by the rules could be denied access.



Penn Waste offers an additional option for the recycling of leaf waste. This is a curbside pick up May through November, the first Saturday of the month. Materials such as tree trimmings, shrubbery and other organic landscape vegetation will be collected. Leaf waste needs to be in biodegradable brown paper bags or bundle it with biodegradable twine in easy-to-handle bundles. Bundles may be no longer than 5 feet, weigh no more than 30 pounds and not exceed 6 inches in diameter. In order to ensure collection of your leaf waste on Saturday mornings, please have material curbside Friday evening. An unlimited number of bags or bundles will be taken. Grass clippings, fruit and vegetables, tree stumps and dirt/stones will not be collected. Leaf waste in plastic bags will not be collected.

LEAF WASTE IS A MANDATORY RECYCLABLE

Home composting is an acceptable form of recycling leaf waste.



Search Tool for Disposal Options on Various Materials

Where can I dispose of rechargeable batteries? What can I do with an old propane tank? Sooner or later, everyone struggles with this type of question. The York County Solid Waste Authority has a website residential disposal search tool. This is a keyword search to look-up donation, recycling and disposal options for various materials. Information can be reached using multiple names for the same item. The search tool is located on the YCSWA website main homepage and on their homepages of the "Disposal of Waste" and "Recycling" sections. This search tool makes it easier for residents to find an answer to the question "What do I do with this?"

Bulk Items

One bulk item per week that can be lifted by two men will be picked up on your regular trash day. Appliances containing Freon must be pre-scheduled by calling Penn Waste at 717-767-4456. For safety purposes, doors to appliances must be removed. Pay Per Bag customers must attach a Penn Waste trash bag to the bulk item.

Acceptable Bulk Items:

Furniture, washer/dryer, hot water tank, dish washers, mattresses, carpet (4' length rolled/tied), kerosene heaters, lawn mowers, and similar (must have a dry fuel tank and lids removed), automobile tire off the rim (1 per week).

Unacceptable Bulk Items:

Household hazardous waste, chemicals, propane tanks, yard waste, construction waste and loose piles.



Please do not place plastic bags in your curbside recycling bins!

Plastic bags get wrapped around the recycling equipment and jam up the machinery. Workers must climb into the machinery to manually remove the plastic bags that get wrapped around the equipment.

Safe Medication Disposal Box

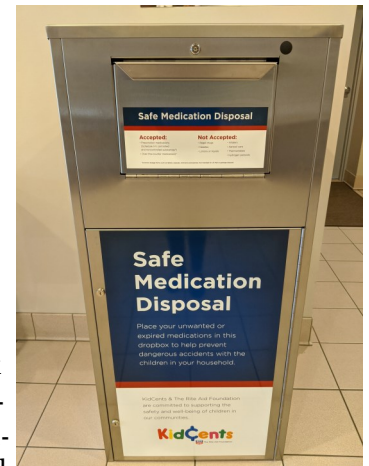
Carroll Township has a Safe Medication Disposal box in the lobby.

Accepted items include: prescriptions, prescription solid or liquid medications, prescription patches & ointments, inhalers, over-the-counter medication, vitamins, and medications for pets.

Not Accepted items include: thermometers, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, personal care products in the form of non-prescription ointments, liquids or lotions, medications from businesses or clinics, needles (sharps), bloody or infectious waste and hazardous waste.

Medications collected in the take-back box program are delivered by law enforcement to the York County Solid Waste Authority's waste-to-energy facility for safe and complete destruction. Law enforcement also maintains the box and secures medications that are received until they can be destroyed.

Eighteen York County police departments currently partner with the York County Solid Waste Authority (YCSWA) to host Secure Medication Disposal boxes in their police department lobbies. In 2021, the program safely collected and disposed of a total of 1.64 tons of unused and expired residential medications. This program helps to eliminate drug abuse by providing a safe means of disposing of drugs and presents an opportunity to educate the public about the potential for abuse of medications.



Retired Flag Disposal Box



Do you have a worn flag to dispose of? Carroll Township has a retired flag drop-off box located just inside the main doors. Collected flags will be given to the American Legion for proper disposal. Flags may be dropped off during normal office hours.

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4)

What you can do to prevent pollutants from entering streams and surface waters:

Urban and Suburban Areas:

- Keep litter, pet wastes, leaves and debris out of street gutters and storm drains—these outlets drain directly to lake, streams, rivers and wetlands.
- Apply lawn and garden chemicals sparingly and according to directions.
- Dispose of used oil, antifreeze, paints and other household chemicals properly—not in storm sewers or drains. If your community does not already have a program for collecting household hazardous wastes, ask your local government to establish one.
- Clean up spilled brake fluid, oil, grease and antifreeze. Do not hose them into the street where they can eventually reach local streams and lakes.
- Control soil erosion on your property by planting ground cover and stabilizing erosion-prone areas.
- Report questionable construction erosion and sediment control practices to the Township.
- Have your septic system inspected and pumped, at a minimum every three years, so that it operates properly.
- Purchase household detergents and cleaners that are low in phosphorous to reduce the amount of nutrients discharged into our lakes, streams and coastal waters.



Forestry:

- Use proper logging and erosion control practices on your forest lands by ensuring proper construction, maintenance, and closure of logging roads and skid trails.
- Work with the Conservation District to determine the best practices to use.
- Report questionable logging practices to York County Conservation District personnel.

Agriculture:

- Manage animal manures to minimize losses to surface water and ground water.
- Reduce soil erosion and nutrient loss by using appropriate conservation practice systems and other applicable best management practices.
- Use planned grazing systems on pasture and rangeland.
- Dispose of pesticides, containers, and tank rinsate in an approved manner.
- Work with conservation partners locally including York County Conservation Districts to understand local strategies.

EMA Updates—Spring 2022

Pennsylvania State Law Title 35 requires all municipalities to engage in “all hazard” disaster planning. Dillsburg, along with five other local municipalities, work as a team to plan for natural and man-made disasters; our team is called the Northern York County Unified EMA (NEMA).

Everyone on our staff is a volunteer- we care about our community and donate our time and our skills to help our community be better prepared. Our mission is to provide for the protection of persons and property in disasters affecting the Northern York County community at large. In simple terms, EMA works for our municipal governments through our planning activities- we are not First Responders although we support our Firefighters, Police and Medical personnel.

What does our local Emergency Management Agency do?

- ◆ maintain an emergency operation center (EOC)- our “office” where we communicate with our local municipalities and York County OEM.
- ◆ maintain a staff per the ICS (Incident Command System) organization chart which is a major component of NIMS (National Incident Management System) – each person has a specific job.
- ◆ maintain an emergency operation plan (EOP) including a notification and resource manual (NARM)

Our primary planning functions include:

- ◆ Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Recovery activities to meet “all hazard” situations.

Prevention activities include public education on skills such as basic first aid and sheltering in place. These skills will reduce the stress on our first responders and on ourselves in disasters.

Updates:

- ◆ We are planning another public education opportunity for June 2022. The “workshop” will be similar to the First Aid Workshop held on November 14, 2021 which was attended by 24 local residents. The format will be another “hands-on” workshop where attendees will learn skills in small groups at various stations. More information will be forthcoming.
- ◆ NEMA completed the purchase of new IT equipment at the end of 2021 for our EOC. Dillsburg Borough staff facilitated the purchase from Dell. NEMA qualified for partial reimbursement from York County through the Act 147 (TMI preparedness) funds.



Severe Weather Hazards:

Most of our regional disasters are weather related. Thousands of residents lost power in late February after heavy rain was followed by high winds. Spring brings the threat of severe thunder storms, high winds and tornadoes. Preparedness means being able to function on your own until the situation is stabilized. Shelter in Place or Evacuate?

Man-made Hazards:

The war in Europe underscores the need for individual preparedness. Thousands of refugees had to leave on short notice as the militaristic Russian government unleashed their arsenal against homes, schools, hospitals and power plants. Shelter in Place or Evacuate?

Now that we’re coming out from under the cloud of Covid, please enjoy time with family, friends and neighbors....and please consider spending some of your time on preparedness.

Dog Licenses are Required

State law requires all dogs over 3 months of age to be licensed. Owners of unlicensed dogs are subject to fines not less than \$50.00 and not to exceed \$300.00. Annual Licenses can be applied for in three different ways; by applying by mail or online to the York County Treasurer, and in person at a participating agent. The following are local agents to apply in person for an annual dog license: Annual Licenses valid from January 1 - December 31

Annual dog license applications can also be downloaded from the website <http://yorkcountypa.gov>. (click on Department, Treasurer and Dog License) and mailed with check or money order to "York County Treasurer".

Dogs three months of age or older may be licensed permanently through the County Treasurer's Office. This lifetime permanent license eliminates the need to purchase annual dog licenses. Questions regarding this procedure should be directed to the Treasurer's Office at 717-771-4386.

Other services the Treasurer's Office can help you with are transferring a dog license between counties, and to a new dog owner and replacement tags for annual or lifetime tags that were damaged or misplaced.



Logan Park

Logan Park has been anything but quiet during the last few months.

The biggest project undertaken at the park in 2021 was the creation of a riparian buffer along the lower part of the park as a result of an agreement with the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay. A path along the buffer was also staked out by a member of DCNR. Over the Columbus Day weekend, 315 trees of 20 varieties were planted with the assistance of park neighbor volunteers. A special thanks and appreciation to Pete Ramsey from Range End Golf Club who brought a zero-turn mower to mow the area.

Security cameras have been installed in various locations in the park to deter vandalism and trespassing at night.

The interior of the barn is also undergoing renovations. The barn utility room was updated to accommodate the camera monitors and a new staircase is in the process of being installed for better accessibility.

Other noted improvements to the park were the installation of two slides and sheds in the park were also spruced up with new paint and roofs.

Highway Department Comments

Carroll Township makes every effort to keep its roads in good condition and safe for travel. Constant work and maintenance goes into keeping our roads hazard free. The Township’s proposed road projects for the summer of 2022 will include the following:

- **Tannery Road** – Storm culvert replacement, road base repair and resurfacing.
- **W. Ridge Road** – Storm culvert replacement, road base repair and resurfacing.
- **Sileo Road** – Road resurfacing.
- **Warrington Road** – Double seal coat (Tar & Chip)

Dates of the proposed work will be posted on the Township website, cable channel, and on site prior to work beginning. Expect road closures or lane restrictions for this work.

The Township Road Crew will be out and about working on various projects and maintenance of infrastructure throughout the Township. As always, please be on the lookout for the crew and use caution when traveling through work areas.

Free Shredding Event

Carroll Township residents and businesses are invited to have “confidential” paper material securely destroyed by Tri-State Shredding. Tri-State Shredding is certified by the National Association for Information Destruction (NAID) and is HIPAA compliant. Items include but are not limited to: old tax returns, pay stubs, bank statements, receipts, utility bills, etc. Staples and paper clips are fine.

Increasingly, Americans are shredding personal and professional documents once they’re no longer needed. An age when identity theft is on the rise is a time when every precaution makes it less likely that you’ll have to deal with the hassle of recovering your identity or regaining access to your accounts. The decision to shred documents rather than merely throwing them away, is a precaution that can (and should) be taken.
